Nineteenth over the Hill Tour—Marys' Logbook

Day One: -Lismore to Armidale

Rejuvenating old rubber parts, Mary reported in the May newsletter of the brake issues her Guzzi sustained prior to the Inverell Rally.

Attending the same rally, I wheeled the 1980 Honda out of hibernation, to discovering a similar issue.

The combination of Covid, 8 months of relatives house restorations and general lack of use caused a few problems.

The brake piston was relatively straightforward, but the rough running at idle and slow speed was postponed till after the rally.

The 4 carburettors were gummed with fuel resins and sediment. With the aid of an ultrasonic cleaner and prepsol as the fluid, the vast array of jets and components gave up there blockages. The other age related problem was the hardening of the 4 rubber carb mounting stubs.

With no prior knowledge of rejuvenating old rubber parts, I typed the issue into a Google search and was amazed at the numerous YouTube, and links on how to achieve usable parts once more.

Most likely, other NRCMCC members know about these cures, but for those that don't I'm happy to share my experience.

The method I choose was to mix "Wintergreen Oil" (an essential oil, used in aromatherapy) in a 50:1 ratio with water.

Other methods took longer and used Isopropyl Alcohol as the carrier for the oil.

I placed the 4 stubs in an old saucepan, with a small square of ply on the bottom to avoid overheating. Pouring in 1 litre of water and 20mml of wintergreen and 2 hours simmering on my camping single burner stove. I turned it on and off so as not to boil the solution. The results were better than expected, even when back at room temperature the parts were still soft and pliable, essential to be able to "shoehorn" the carbs back in situ. A 100ml satchel of oil was delivered in 4 days from eBay for \$19.50. My workshop has never smelt better!

Pure 100% Wintergreen is toxic and gloves need to be worn, avoid the vapours from the saucepan. For any members who have hard to find or unobtanium rubber parts, this might help. Thanks also to Bryson who showed me a better way of preserving fuel systems, other than keeping fully fuelled. Regards from David Charlton.

As I mentioned we made our first morning tea stop at Lawrence basking in the sunshine at the river's edge. Just out of Lawrence Michael and Julia pulled off to the side of the road. We got the thumbs up to indicate that we didn't need to stop and help them. We continued on wondering why they had stopped thinking that they just wanted to take some pictures. It wasn't long before they joined us at the morning tea stop and we found out that they had spotted a downed wallaby on the roadside. Upon investigation the mother looked to have a broken back and needed to be euthanized. A joey was found squirming in her pouch and this was rescued and a call was put into Wires. Dinner that night was left up to individual tastes. Some went to the "best" fish and chip shop and others went to the local Bowls Club. Everyone enjoyed their meals wherever they went.

So Tuesday morning rolls around and some of us went to Beach Bums for breakfast. The food was great and there was even entertainment in the form of the local seniors iceberg swimmers heading into the surf for their morning swim. After breakfast, people went off for various adventures. Some headed down the coast to Seal Rocks while others went to Nabiac to visit the National Motorcycle Museum. Operating Heritage Australia How much carbon does your historic vehicle emit?

On the table find where your vehicle's km/year intersects with its fuel consumption to find CO2 emitted in kg.

e.g. Based on the latest FIVA survey, Australian historic cars travel, on average, around 1200 km/yr and, if we assume a 14L/100km (20mpg) fuel consumption, then the amount of carbon dioxide produced is 504kg for the year.

As a comparison:

- A human breathes out around 240kg CO2
- A medium-sized dog produces (breathing and food) 700-800kg CO; per year.
- A typical electric car driving 10,000 km per year and charged from the grid produces around 1150kg per year.

Politicians decision-makers, and the general public need to know that the contribution of historic vehicles to carbon emissions is tiny, and that we are working to eliminate, through wise use, and renewable fuels or offsets, even that small amount.

What can you do?

- Know how much carbon dioxide your historic vehicle actually emits each year
- Let your family, friends and colleagues know how little CO₂ your historic vehicle emits
- Support your peak bodies' efforts to inform regulators that historic vehicles are not the problem
- Ensure your club and other historic motoring events you attend adopt environmentally appropriate procedures
- Be aware of, and ready to use, suitable
- Consider carbon offsetting for your vehicle/s -In 2023 the average historic motor vehicle can offset its total carbon emissions through ethical means for under \$20 per year.

Operating Heritage Australia supports a threestep approach to minimising carbon emissions from historic vehicles and machinery:

- min mise use of fossil fuels
- use renewable fuels where appropriate.
- where no atternative is available, offset emissions by supporting projects that consume more carbon digxide than we produce.
