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Stinkwheel Run - March 20







Winner of the Jack Ahearn trophy for best club restoration during the year - John Mazzer with his Bantam

The Jack Ahearn trophy is judged within the club and the award is for best restoration completed in the preceding twelve months by a club member.

John's BSA Bantam is an excellent example of a bike that is not over restored. No repainting was done and the original finish maintained and given a coat of lanolin to preserve it. Many restorers now try to maintain the finish of the bike as it was found - the wear and scratches and even surface rust are preserved - sometimes with a clear coat to protect them. The patina is considered to be apart of the bikes history. In some auctions, vehicles with 'as found' finish have fetched more than full restorations with new chrome and paint.


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Book of the Month:

A classic this month - Robert M Pirsig's classic of philosophy - explored through the metaphor of motorcycle maintenance.

In the book, the Narrator describes the "Romantic" approach to the life of his friend, John Sutherland, who chooses not to learn how to maintain his expensive new motorcycle. John simply hopes for the best with his bike, and when problems do occur he often becomes frustrated and is forced to rely on professional mechanics to repair it. In contrast, the "classical" Narrator has an older motorcycle which he is usually able to diagnose and repair himself through the use of rational problem-solving skills.

In an example of the classical approach, Pirsig explains to the reader that one must pay continual attention: when the Narrator and his friends came into Miles City, Montana^[3] he notices that the "engine idle is loping a little," a possible indication that the fuel/air mixture is <u>too rich</u>. The next day he is thinking of this as he is going through his ritual to adjust the valves on his cycle's engine. During the adjustment, he notes that both spark plugs are black, confirming a rich mixture. He recognizes that the feel-good-higher-altitude-mountainair is causing the engine to run rich. New jets are purchased, and installed, and with the valves adjusted, the engine runs well again.



With this, the book details two types of personalities: those who are interested mostly in gestalts (romantic view-points, such as Zen, focused on being "In the moment", and not on rational analysis), and those who seek to know the details, understand the inner workings, and master the mechanics (classic viewpoints with application of rational analysis, vis-a-vis motorcycle maintenance) and so on.

So where do you sit? Are you the practical, planning, concrete bike owner - thinking rationally and objectively? Or are you the romantic who sees motorcycles as a wonderful means of transport, ignore the engineering, get the wind in your hair and bugs in your teeth, and your heart rate pumping. A means of impressing the pillion and all who see you on your 'white stallion'?

Myself - I'm think I'm a bit of both; the practical engineer who hopes to fix problems - or even better, avoid them through good maintenance - but I do enjoy leaning into corners and accelerating up steep hills and wishing the girls were more impressed. RS
